Generation Z, this current generation of university students and young adults, are sometimes thought of with suspicion. As a Millennial, I never appreciated others pigeonholing me and my peers into an entitled, lazy stereotype. Generation Z is so much more than a phone-addicted generation (although they probably wouldn't argue that phones can sometimes be an issue). It's been my joy to witness some of the different ways God is gifting them. I will share three examples from this past year with hopes it will inspire you.

Example #1. As the internship team and I discussed a sensitive issue it was not I, the (trained) chaplain, who came up with a solution. I was stumped. It was the interns themselves who concocted a better response than I could have imagined, who found a way to discuss the problem graciously with each other. I saw them work with a high level of emotional and pastoral sensitivity. I took notes!

Example #2. After a Feast & Faith discussion on Christianity and the environment the classic (and understandable) Generation Z hopelessness about the climate took off. During discussion time students were evidently overwhelmed and paralyzed, and the conversation became about a whole host of broader, global issues. It was one of the students who closed the discussion in a mic-drop moment as she exhorted her peers to convert their fears and passions into a vocational calling, with God's help to hone in on one or two issues. Going around the room she honoured a number of the students by pointing out the ways she already saw God at work in and through them and suggested ways they might be agents of redemption in the world. We ended with a prophetic word.


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

Example #3. At our winter retreat we dove into the book of Job. And some of the most Spirit-filled teachers were not the ones who knew the definition of theodicy. On a sunny Saturday afternoon when other students were still in bed, these retreatants sat with the Scripture and combed through theological articles, biblical commentaries, and scholarly textbooks so that they could return together and share with one another what they learned about God's text. There were Venn diagrams and wacky illustrations and deeply resonant observations as these future leaders walked one another through the passages. They knew how to wrestle with Scripture and we were all blessed by each other's knowledge.

At the end of our retreat we shared some of our laments and difficulties since Job is an evocative book in this wav. These students are struggling with some of the same problems many generations have grappled with in the past; and some issues that are distinctively different. But God is not done. The Spirit is still (and always has been) equipping people for the work of the Kingdom. There are certainly important factors we need to consider as to why Generation Z is underrepresented in our churches. I have been noticing through campus ministry that willingness, skill, and gifting are likely not the culprits. I don't quite know how to bridge the gap, but I do know I am excited for these young leaders to keep stepping into their callings.

As we've been working our way through the book of Mark while enjoying a slice of pizza, I've seen the Holy Spirit illumine Scripture and been amazed by how Scripture reveals the compassionate servant heart of Jesus and how He calls His followers to express their faith.

One of the highlights of the year was having Dr. Peter Schuurman come and talk about Global Scholars Canada with all the grad students. Over desserts we enjoyed a great discussion about the **importance of having a Christian network within academia** as a grad student or professor. This grad ministry has been such a blessing to me, and I pray that it will continue and expand next year and following!
